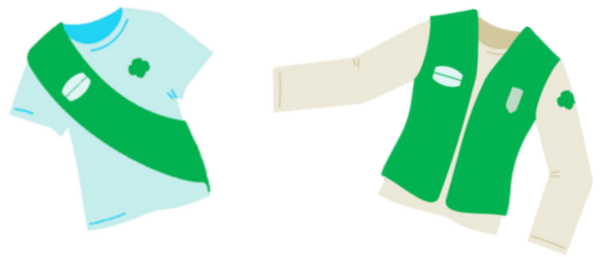




# Lunar New Year Patch of the Month

We invite you to take this opportunity to learn more about the culture and traditions associated with this holiday. We've got plenty of activities to choose from, so you can make new discoveries and have tons of fun learning while earning a fun patch.

Theme	Activities
Art (dance, music, theater, painting, etc.)	<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. Visit this <a href="#">website</a> to listen to music about plum blossoms, melting snow, and arrival of springtime.</li><li>2. Learn about common instruments used in music made for Lunar New Year.</li><li>3. Research artwork that symbolizes the Lunar New Year.</li><li>4. The Lion Dance is a traditional dance often performed during Lunar New Year. Watch three different videos of unique Lion Dance performances</li><li>5. Explore commonly used decorations for Lunar New Year and craft one for your own home!</li></ol>
Community Traditions (food, folklore, origins, etc.)	<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>6. How is the date of the Lunar New Year determined?</li><li>7. In Korea, Lunar New Year traditions may be different. How do people in Korea celebrate Seollal, their version of Lunar New Year?</li><li>8. Read a story about Losar, the Tibetan celebration of Lunar New Year.</li><li>9. Research the foods prepared for a traditional New Year banquet.</li><li>10. Prepare a dish that is commonly eaten during Lunar New Year Celebrations.</li><li>11. What is the Lantern Festival?</li><li>12. If you want the new year to bring you luck, what foods would you eat to bring you luck during your Lunar New Year celebration?</li></ol>

Calculate your Lunar New Year age – how is it different than your traditional American age?</li><li>14. Make a list of ten ways that Lunar New Year celebrations have changed over the past ten years.</li><li>16. Research and list the dates for the Lunar New Year of 2024, 2025, and 2026.</li><li>17. How is the Lunar calendar different from the calendar traditionally observed in the United States?</li></ol>
