How to earn your Presents with a Purpose Patch

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- Look at local charity websites to learn about what they do and how they serve the community.
- Read a book that inspires you to want to give back to your community.
- Listen to music that inspires you to use your talents to help others.
- Sketch pictures of ideas or ways you can help individuals and families in your community
- Make time for personal reflection. Jot down your thoughts and feelings about what you've learned so far in a journal or notebook.
- Schedule time during a troop meeting to have a discussion about "needs" versus "wants." Share examples of both and discuss how many people in our local communities may not have all of their "wants" or "needs" fulfilled.



- Visit a local homeless shelter, soup kitchen, or other local organization to learn more about how these organizations serve people who don't have all their needs met.
- Invite a representative from a local charity that helps families in need to a troop meeting to learn about what they do and how they serve the community
- Ask teachers, family members, friends, neighbors, or members of your church if they know of a particular individual, group. elderly neighbors, or families in need. As a troop, brainstorm ways you may be able to help meet their specific needs.
- Interview a local business to ask them how their company gives back to the local community.
- Brainstorm a list of special talents in your troop may have, and how you can use them in a community service project.



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- Sign up for a group volunteer project through your local United Way. Many local United Ways coordinate regular volunteer projects for community volunteers to help local organizations, such as collection drives, book drives, and delivering goods like blankets, hygiene kits, and school supplies.
- Start a collection drive for a specific community organization for items like winter coats, hats, mittens, children's toys and other gifts, or other items.
- Host a fundraiser to raise money for a local organization that serves a group in need.
- Create a community "wish list" and share it with family, friends, relatives, neighbors, and others in your community. Invite people to sign up to purchase an item from the list, then collect, wrap, and deliver all the gifts to the individual or family who needs them.
- Start a club at your school to teach other kids about these important causes and inspire them to give back.
- Create a display or bulletin board for your school, church, or community that tells about how your troop's mission to help the community.
- Inspire others to practice big and small acts of kindness.
